

The play will be performed without an intermission and is approximately 55 minutes long.

Do you know what a Traje de Mariachi is?

A Mariachi Traje (trah-hay) has origins in both Mexican folk wear from the Jalisco area and the Traje de Charro (horseman's suit). The current traditional look of the Mariachi developed in the 20th century when after the Revolution of 1910, the Mexican government began to promote the Mariachi as an identifiable unified cultural symbol of nationalism. The formal version is an elegantly snug-fitting short jacket, and high, tight black pants that flare over the boot at the hem. As women became mariachis as well, a long, slim skirt was added. Some variations like the Gala suit have multiple silver décor called Botonadura, while others have elaborate braid or embroidery (Greca). The outfit is often complemented by a large bowtie, a wide belt and a sombrero. Many modern variations have been developed, but generally at least bow to the traditional outfit, because Mexico's history, complexity and contrasts are vividly illustrated in the tradition of this suit, which reflects the nation's pride, passion and respect for heritage, custom and tradition. What an incredible opportunity for me to work with the wonderfully talented production team of ASTC and the vibrant young actors of NMSU Theatre Arts and DACC! And to tell the story of *Mariachi Girl*.

The mission of theatre arts at DACC is to celebrate the unique diversity of our community and in particular to produce the work of Latinx playwrights. I first heard of *Mariachi Girl* at a conference attended by Texas playwright and educator Roxanne Schroeder-Arce and I have been waiting for the chance to do it. I knew this lovely space and the dedicated theatre artists at ASTC would make Cita's story sing!

It is important to tell the story through the lens of our border region and let it resonate for our Mexican-American students and community. It is also important to see the universality of Cita's sueños, her dreams. Cita wants to be a mariachi, but she could just as easily want to be a scientist or a football player, all male dominated worlds. But we will tell the story of a young girl's dream to be like her father from the cultural perspective of our region, which has somehow been left out of the universal lexicon, seen as different or somehow not belonging. In our hearts we know this story could be anyone's, anywhere. As Carmen says in the play, 'We have to share who we are or it dies with us'.

So enjoy the show, and feel free to shout or lend your own 'gritos' to celebrate Cita's story with us!

About the Playwright and Composer



Roxanne Schroeder-Arce (Playwright) is an artist, scholar and teacher. She currently serves as assistant professor of theatre education at the University of Texas at Austin Department of Theatre and Dance. Prior to her current appointment, she taught at Emerson College and California State University, Fresno.

Schroeder-Arce received her MFA in drama and theatre for youth from the University of Texas at Austin and her bachelor's degree and teaching credential from Emerson College. She taught high-school theatre in Texas for six years and served as artistic and education director of TEATRO Humanidad in Austin for several years. Schroeder-Arce's bilingual plays have been presented to children and families in theatres throughout the United States. Her plays Señora Tortuga, Legend of the Poinsettia and Sangre de un Ángel are also published by Dramatic Publishing.

Héctor Martínez Morales (Composer) is originally from Hermosillo, Sonora, Mexico. He studied composition in the United States as well as in Paris, France. His works have been performed throughout the U.S. and Mexico. He has appeared as soloist with orchestras and lectured at the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston; Tufts University; and the Istanbul Technical University in Turkey. He has received commissions from Chicago Symphony Orchestra musicians and the American Composers Forum. Martínez Morales also has a performance background in Latin-American folk music and mariachi. Also a pianist, he has performed his own works at venues such as New York University. Martínez Morales is an educator and freelance composer based out of Boston.

PRODUCTION BIOGRAPHIES

Layle Chambers (Director) Layle is a teaching/artist and Associate Professor of Theatre Arts at Doña Community College of New Mexico State University. She received her Bachelor of Fine Arts from Ithaca College in upstate New York, spent a decade working in New York City, and then pursued her Master's Degree from the University of Texas at El Paso, which she received in 2001. Layle co-founded Outrageous Fortune Theatre Company; working as Artistic Director, actor, grant writer and playwright focusing on innovative production of classic works for Young Audiences.

Thomas Garcia (Music Director) Thomas is a long time local musician and teacher. He received his Bachelor's in music education from New Mexico State University in 2009. He has performed with and studied under world class musicians in the classical and mariachi musical worlds. Groups under his direction have performed at many venues including Disney Land, Disney World, and the New Mexican Palace of the Governors. His students have received numerous awards in competitions and festivals. His dream is to open people's ears and hearts with music. He currently has a music education app available on the Google Playstore called Music Mover.

Violet Griffin (Assistant Director) Violet is a senior at NMSU she is currently finishing up her last semester and will be graduating with a B.A. in Theatre Arts. This is her first assistant director position. During her time at NMSU she has played Kim in *Purple Breasts*, Understudy for Clarise in *The Servant of Two Masters*, Charwoman/Passerby in *A Christmas Carol*, and Linney In *Truth Dare...* Although she is an actor she does have an interest in directing. She plans on moving to Los Angeles soon after she graduates to peruse her career.

RESIDENT COMPANY BIOGRAPHIES

Claudia Billings holds a B.S. in Theatre and Dance from the University of Wyoming and an M.A. in English Literature from NMSU. She currently teaches Introduction to Theatre and Acting. She also acts and directs for ASTC at NMSU.

Jim Billings received an M.F.A. in Scenic Design from the California Institute of the Arts. He has worked as a freelance designer around the country, and came to NMSU in 1985. Design credits include design for dance, theatre, opera, industrials and museums. Jim was awarded the Ralph B. Crouch Award for "Outstanding contributions to the life of the NMSU community."

Deborah Brunson received a B.F.A. in Costume Design from The University of Alabama in 1977, and an M.F.A. in Costume Design from the University of Texas at Austin in 1980. She has been Resident Costume Designer at NMSU since 1988. She designs and fabricates for a variety of artistic areas.

Tamara M. Carruthers received a Bachelor of Arts in Theatre Arts from New Mexico State University. She managed NMSU's Costume Shop for three semesters directly after graduation. She then joined Wayside Theatre (Middletown, VA) and spent ten years as their Resident Costume Designer and Shop Manager. She has spent the last five summers in the Costume Shop at Creede Repertory Theater (Creede, CO) designing and serving as their Draper, Draper/First Hand, Assistant Costume Shop Manager and, most recently, Costume Shop Manager.

Nichole Hamilton Nichole earned a BA in Theatre from the University of Montevallo near Birmingham, Alabama (PV!) and an MFA in Acting from the University of Florida in Gainesville, FL (Go Gators!). Post graduate school, she taught adjunct at the University of Florida for classes in Voice, Acting I-III, Audition Workshop, and Theatre Appreciation. Currently, Nichole is teaching an online Theatre Aesthetics course for incarcerated students through Ashland University in Ohio. Nichole is a proud member of Actor's Equity, a company member and advisory committee member at the Hippodrome Theatre in Gainesville Florida, and a teacher candidate with the Michael Chekhov Association. She has worked professionally as an actor, director and sometimes stage manager with companies in NYC, MA, FL, GA, TN, NC and CA. This summer, Nichole performed her devised solo performance entitled Dame daDA & the Meta Show at the Minnesota Fringe Festival. She is thrilled and honored to join the faculty at NMSU (Go Aggies!).

David L. Hereford received his B.F.A. in Theatre from UNM in 1978. He spent five summers at the Santa Fe Opera and a summer in the props shop at the Oregon Shakespeare Festival in Ashland, Oregon, as well as being the Props Master at the Manitoba Theatre Centre in Winnipeg, and a scenic carpenter at the Denver Center Theatre Company.

Wil Kilroy joined NMSU after many years in Maine where he was Chair and Professor of Theatre at the University of Southern Maine. At USM he directed dozens of plays and musicals including A Midsummer Night's Dream and The Laramie Project which were invited to Kennedy Center regional festivals. Wil has worked nationally as an actor, with roles ranging from Steve in Becky's New Car to Laertes in Hamlet, and on TV productions such as All My Children and Babylon Five, and is an annual alumni guest artist with The State Ballet of Rhode Island. As the co-founder of the National Michael Chekhov Association, Wil has taught nationally and internationally. Wil was awarded the Kennedy Center bronze medallion for achievement in Theatre Education in 2014.

James Jaworski comes from Buffalo, NY. Jim is a regionally-recognized artist and bowl maker and spends his "free time" making bowls and finding lumber.

Larissa Lury is a director, actor, acrobat, and teacher. At NMSU, in addition to teaching and directing, she heads the American Southwest Children's Theatre Company. She directs and workshops plays in NYC and regionally, focusing primarily on the development of new plays, two of which were nominated for (and one of which won) Best Play from the San Diego Critics Circle following the productions she directed. She was recently selected to be one of the inaugural recipients of the National Directors Fellowship. She was a Resident Director at Ensemble Studio Theatre from 2008-09, is a member of the Lincoln Center Theater Directors Lab, and an Affiliated Artist and a 2016-17 Audrey Resident with New Georges. MFA, UC San Diego. BS, Northwestern University.

Megan McQueen is a proud graduate of NMSU, earning a Bachelor of Music degree with a minor in theater and a Master of Arts in Education. During her undergraduate studies, she began professional work for various theater companies and arts organizations as an actress, producer, director, stage manager, and arts administrator in New Mexico, Texas, and Pennsylvania.
